St. Thomas' Episcopal Church Vestry Minutes May 26, 2024

Present: Susan Beattie, Martha Berry, John Bowen, Connie Harsh, Rose Novak, John Orr, Jane Welsh (presiding)

Absent: Brooks Cato, Wynn Egginton, Maureen Ghent, Kerry Linden, Valerie Morkevicius, Anne Perring

Call to Order

The meeting began at 11:30 a.m. in the parish hall. Connie Harsh led the opening prayer.

Clerk's Report

The minutes of the April 28th vestry meeting were approved as submitted in final draft. Approval was moved by Susan Beattie; seconded by John Orr.

Treasurer's Report

John Bowen submitted the following report to the vestry members:

“Pledges appear robust but figures are a bit inflated by some early bulk pledges. Plate income is at 94% expected to date reflecting good attendance. There were no unexpected expenses and all bills are being paid. At present we have a healthy balance in the checking account. We have not yet needed to draw funds from endowment to meet ongoing expenses.

Some errors persist in Church Windows which we will be addressing in coming weeks. We will be submitting records for the annual audit over the summer. We plan to have a preliminary budget in time for the annual meeting in September.”

Jane Welsh moved that the Treasurer's Report be received; Martha Berry seconded the motion. The Report was received as submitted.

Rector's Report

There was no Rector's Report, the rector being on sabbatical at the moment.

Wardens' Report

Jane Welsh described the current moment at St. Thomas' as being “novel.” However, she felt that things are going very well. The parish is running smoothly. Both she and Martha Berry, our junior

warden, are happy to come in and meet with people who want to share concerns. Martha seconded these sentiments. Susan Beattie and Rose Novak offered thanks to the wardens for keeping things on course. John Bowen noted that the wardens seemed to jump right in and get to work, which is reassuring.

Commission Reports

- *Buildings:* John Orr updated the vestry by describing the process of analysis that the condition report has undergone during the past few weeks. He noted that the most pressing elements have been isolated and the parish will be asking the authors to serve as our general contractors as we move ahead to address the critical issues first. A prioritized list of items has been sent to them for review, and the parish will begin there. Moving on, John reported that the kitchen dishwasher was about to be installed in the parish hall. (By the writing of these minutes, the task has been accomplished.) The oil tank has been removed from the rectory. Problems with an outside light (the church side) have been corrected. The issues concerning the East-West beam on our church security system are being addressed. We are waiting for Brian Treffeisen to schedule the work that needs to be done on the south entry to the church.

Old Business

- *Vestry Nominations:* Jane Welsh reminded vestry members of the requirements for vestry replacement positions. Susan Beattie kindly offered to organize outgoing members so that this task could be accomplished by the deadline.

New Business

- *Ramshaw Scholarships:* Jane Welsh asked vestry members whether they thought that June 16th might be a good day to award the Ramshaw Awards. This is a Rite II service day and it would also be a time when seniors are still in school, but nearing the end of term. The vestry approved of Jane's choice and set the date for the Awards at June 16th.
- *July 4th Hotdog Giveaway:* Jane Welsh reminded vestry members that St. Thomas' would be giving away hotdogs on the church side lawn this year. Volunteers would be needed. People should see

Deb Barker and Eric Mueller. Susan Beattie wondered whether Emmanuel Episcopal Church in Norwich would again be donating the hotdogs and rolls. Jane Welsh replied that she would check on this. Connie Harsh added that she had learned, through an article in *The Wall Street Journal*, that Costco hotdogs were rated #1 in taste tests. (Unfortunately, the closest Costco is in Camillus, NY.)

[Here, the vestry went into executive session, just for a few moments, to discuss several upcoming events.]

Core Priorities: Return to Fundraising

Jane Welsh inquired as to what the vestry members might most be thinking about at the moment. She mentioned fundraising as one key topic that had emerged persistently during the past nine months. John Orr commented that this has been much on his mind. He wondered whether perhaps it's time to begin organizing something more. Discussion ranged around amongst vestry members in a casual manner as they considered how much structure might be useful. Some thought that a casual approach might be best, perhaps something as simple as a mailing in which a letter outlined parish projects and monetary needs. Others thought that this would not work well owing to the scale of the giving campaign that the parish is envisioning. (For a more modest scale a letter might be sufficient.) Some wondered if a fundraising campaign might work better if the parish felt more unified. Perhaps this is a time to think about a "friendship campaign," as well as fundraising. Connie Harsh recalled an earlier moment in parish history when activities such as adult education, encompassing book groups and such, seemed organized to better draw folks together. John Bowen felt that this struck a chord with him as well, although he wondered if inviting people to speak informally at the coffee hour might be a good way to bring people in. Others considered how everyone could gain a greater familiarity with others. As the discussion period came to an end, vestry members agreed that the conversation should continue at future meetings.

Announcements:

- *Announcements:* Announcements of importance to the parish were made.
- *Next meeting:* The next meeting is set for June

23rd.

- *Prayer Leader:* Valerie Morkevicius will lead prayer at the opening of the next vestry meeting.

At this point Jane Welsh asked whether there was anything else to discuss. Seeing nothing, Jane moved that the meeting be over; Rose Novak seconded the motion. The meeting ended at 12:29 p.m.

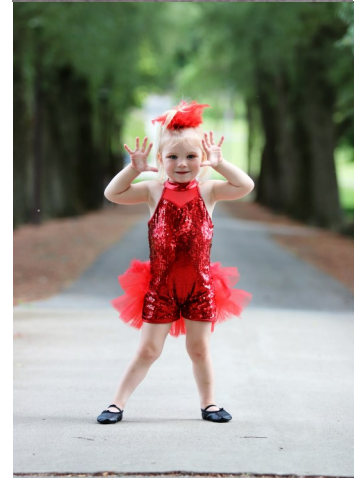
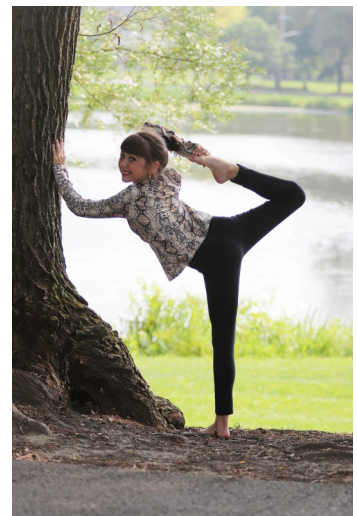
